Table Top Exercise Presentation of Proposed Solutions	A team project: Each team will present (in a format of their own choosing, the originality and professional quality of which will be part of the assessment) their main findings of solutions for the problems discussed during the exercise. Main problems and related questions are defined in the Table Top Exercise guidance document. Regardless of the presentation format chosen, the assignment must include a document summarizing the proposed solutions. Presentations and summarizing document should at least cover the following aspects: • First decision to be addressed after the IND detonation • How the decision is communicated • How the response is organized • How the impacts and consequences of the detonation are assessed • How to ensure a Common Operation Picture (COP) • How to inform the public • How to evaluate effectiveness of crisis management communication • How to prioritize response tasks • How to prioritize, assign/allocate, and direct incoming assets, commodities, and resources, and how to manage these processes • What preparedness gaps were detected and how to close them • Non-traditional approaches to scenario response identified	The presentations should be 5 minutes long and will be held during the Hot Wash session on April 4, 2017, 1-3 p.m. The summarizing document must be uploaded on Canvas before the ending time of the course on Friday 4, 2017	30
