

Welcome to Currents

A greeting from the Provost and Dean

(Editor's Note: The following is excerpted from Provost and Dean Madlyn L. Hanes' State-of-the-College remarks to faculty and staff at the recent All-College Meeting.)

It is an absolute pleasure to greet you today and to extend best wishes for the 2001-2002 academic year. This All-College Day makes the start of a new academic year a near reality—of course the first day of classes seals the deal.

In preparation for occasions such as these, I reflect as do we all, appreciating how far we've come; appreciating the collective achievements we've managed. And I look ahead, appreciating the work yet to be done.

This is a particularly meaningful time for me personally, because I am just days away from completing my first year with you. I used this occasion to measure, quite frankly, how far I have come. I established personal goals early on and set expectations that I shared with you last year at my inaugural All- College Day. First and foremost, I said that I would learn as much and as quickly about the College as I could. This I did.

I attended a good number of the many events we sponsor—all of which, I believe, add to the intellectual vitality and cultural diversity of the College. I enjoyed brilliant presentations from our visiting scholars, artists, alumni and community leaders, and participated in the growing number of activities that bring together our respective campuses and broader communities. I attended meetings and special events, including town meetings, faculty forums, boards, councils, committees, and ceremonies – each of which has given me access to you and you to me. I learned from them all and my appreciation of the enthusiasm for the College demonstrated by our faculty, students, staff, alumni and advisers heightened with each encounter. We are indeed fortunate to have such talent and commitment to propel us.

What a remarkable year this has been. We have much to show for it. We reached new heights — admitting first year students at the Harrisburg campus for the IST degree and graduating the first class of the associate IST degree at Schuylkill. This year, we celebrated the largest graduating class at each of our two campuses. History in the making!

I want to share some personal moments as an observer and participant that I vividly recall from our first year together. Moments – and there are many— that brought me immediately closer to this College, closer to you and to our many constituents, and moments that helped to introduce me to the College's traditions and culture. I will mention just a few, and in no particular order.

Last Spring I attended the annual University's Teaching and Learning Colloquy, and I sat in the audience as a team from our Capital College Teaching and Learning Consortium presented its best practices. Proud? Yes I was, but prouder still as I became absorbed in the efforts of our Consortium colleagues from the School of Humanities to perfect the teaching-learning enterprise. Their presentation demonstrated, much to my delight, the good work we do to enhance student involvement and responsibility in their own learning, to promote the importance of collaborative and active learning, and the smart use of technology to extend learning beyond the classroom. Learning is, after all, our preoccupation; it is central to all that we do. Our colleagues reminded us that we at Capital College "do" learning exceedingly well.

I recall, too, the Alumni Mentoring Program at Harrisburg, an evening when mentors and mentees came together in a year-end celebration. I recall the Alumni Fellows honored at each of our campuses and I recall the initial dinner meeting of our newly established Alumni Society at Schuylkill. Overwhelming enthusiasm and commitment! Our alumni volunteers care deeply about our well-being and see us as vital to the well-being of their respective communities, professions and organizations. We are fortunate to have these relationships. We are now 30,000 alumni strong. That's a lot of blue and white!

Our commencement exercises—just the right touch of pomp and circumstance and individual attention. Life's memories are made here and realized in these ceremonies. Our graduates and their families are proud, happy and grateful. Graduates walk across the stage in triumph. And they should. Our students, so many of them, persist in their programs of study, balancing the demands of family and work. Their success is the truest measure of our own and we look upon their triumph as ours

as well. We cannot help but rejoice in their achievement.

In November, in the midst of a most extraordinary presidential election, certainly the most extraordinary election in my lifetime, I stayed tuned to PCN in the late evenings and watched the replay of earlier live broadcasts of our political analyst colleagues from our School of Public Affairs. They spoke eloquently and tirelessly about Decision 2000 and its seemingly endless search for resolution. I never tired of their insight. I remain an avid fan.

Our commitment to diversity and global education was invigorated. Key events we'll enjoy this year were in the making a good bit of last year. This November we will co-sponsor a visit by Maya Angelou to the city of Harrisburg in conjunction with Downtown Improvement, Inc. and the Downtown Center of Penn State Harrisburg to benefit the Urban League. There will be a visit to the Schuylkill campus by James McBride, author of *The Color of Water*, in conjunction with the freshman summer reading program initiated this year at Schuylkill. We are attending well to international education. Some 500 students participated in international programs this past year alone. Expanded opportunities for our students remain central to our planning efforts.

Looking ahead. We want to be the College of first choice for our students. We want them to come to us with the wherewithal to succeed, to meet their personal and educational learning goals and to leave us prepared for life's next milestones and with an appetite for lifelong learning. Our current students rate us highly on satisfaction surveys; our incoming students tell us that our academic reputation drew them to us in the first place. We need to stay connected for all the right reasons.

Looking ahead. We want to be the exemplars—advancing in significant ways the University's long-standing vision and goals in achieving seamless education, international and global education, collaborative and interdisciplinary learning, and a climate for learning that appreciates diversity and sustains a commitment to outreach. We make important contributions to these arenas in addition to advancing the University's ultimate goal of pre-eminence in the integration of teaching, research and service. We exemplify these values.

We have accomplished much. It's been a good year, and we are poised to accomplish even more. A heartfelt thanks to you all.

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Here's your opportunity to return to the classroom

As participants in the Harrisburg campus Alumni Weekend Oct. 19 and 20, you and your family will have the opportunity to "return to the classroom." But this time there will be no exams, papers, or projects. Information and enjoyment will be the order of the day.

As a key item in Saturday's ambitious list of events and activities for all ages, a number of faculty and staff will present educational programs on key topics of interest. And while you enjoy the presentations, a special "Kids' College" activity is planned for the younger set. The lineup of presenters and their topics includes:

The Amish - Dr. Richard Ammon, representing the School of Behavioral Sciences and Education, will use his unique work with the Amish in Pennsylvania as the basis for his presentation which will include a discussion and slide presentation on four of the books he has authored — An Amish Christmas, An Amish Wedding, An Amish Year, and Amish Horses. As a special treat, a book signing will follow his presentation.

Language and Power - Dr. David Morand, of the School of Business Administration, is well known for his research and teaching in organizational structures. His presentation will focus on how organizations (particularly businesses) are impacted by the verbal and nonverbal cues that we all use to communicate. This presentation will discuss research into the "politeness" phenomenon, which illustrates how relative power is embedded in a number of everyday, but often subtle, linguistic cues. The implications of this view of power for understanding the politics of interpersonal relations at work, and for enhancing effective communication in organizations, are discussed.

Pennsylvania Germans - Dr. Irwin Richman from the School of Humanities will use his unique style to discuss the role of Pennsylvania Germans in Central Pennsylvania. He will discuss how this group of people still characterizes the region, and influences its culture and food. Using numerous slides, Dr. Richman will introduce or re-introduce you to the architecture of the Pennsylvania German landscape. He will even answer the age-old question, "Why do Pennsylvania German houses have two front doors?"

The Race for Governor – With the political atmosphere surrounding the governor's race in Pennsylvania heating up, Director of the School of Public Affairs Steven Peterson and Dr. Michael Young will host a panel of leading political figures and journalists in discussing this important election. Since the governor of Pennsylvania has an impact on your alma mater, come and find out where the race stands.

Environmental Training Center - Berg Professor of Engineering Charles Cole of the School of Science, Engineering, and Technology and his colleagues will host a tour and discussion of the state-of-the-art Environmental Training Center in the Science and Technology Building on campus. The tour includes a working example of a wastewater treatment plant and other working exhibits of research going on to protect our environment. The facility, which houses ongoing cooperative projects among the University, Pennsylvania DEP and U.S. EPA, is the focal point for the whole University and region for operations training in the water and wastewater field.

Kids' College - Bring your children to Kids' College, coordinated by Michael Corradino with the College's Office of Continuing and Distance Education. While you are participating in some educational programs, your children can participate in age-appropriate, supervised activities. You must pre-register your children if you would like them to participate.

Alumni Society makes commitment to community

The group will also be coordinating a project benefiting international visitors to campus.

Sloane encourages alumni to become involved with the committee's activities to serve the community. "From two hours per year to two hours per week, every moment of volunteer service helps others and contributes to the civility of our society. The committee and I look forward to coordinating many worthy community projects in which Penn State Harrisburg alumni may participate," she adds.

Usage at campus libraries skyrockets

When you attend the Harrisburg campus alumni weekend, one of the highlights of your tour of the "new" campus most certainly will be the

But the new library at Penn State Harrisburg

is just one of two outstanding facilities serving Capital College. The Ciletti Library on the Schuylkill campus has experienced an increase in usage by both the College community and the general public in providing reference,



lending, and technology-based services.

Dr. Harold B. Shill, Director of Capital College Libraries, shares these recent, impressive library facts:

- 195,616 persons visited the Penn State Harrisburg library in 2000-01; the previous record was 149,613 in 1988-89; usage is up 34.1% from 1999-2000 level;
- Ciletti Library usage is up as much as 39.4% from 1999-2000;
- Circulation was 42,000+ at Harrisburg, increasing for the 4th consecutive year; circulation is up 14.8% at Schuylkill;
- Circulation rate at Penn State Harrisburg (18.53 books per student) is the highest in the entire University Libraries system, including University Park;
- 120,335 items were re-shelved at Penn State Harrisburg in 2000-01, showing high level of in-library collection use;
- 7% of loans at Penn State Harrisburg are by community borrowers;
- Interlibrary loan is up 97% in past three years at Harrisburg, reaching the 20,349 transaction level; and was up 53.4% in the past year at Schuylkill.

University scholar's baccalaureate success began at Schuylkill

Deer Lake resident Laura E. Loder completed her baccalaureate studies at Penn State by attaining one of the highest honors afforded an undergraduate — student marshal for Eberly College of Science commencement exercises on Aug. 4.

A biology major, Laura was selected to represent her class on the strength of her outstanding academic record. During her studies at Penn State, she amassed a 3.9 grade-point average and also conducted research in the laboratories of Professor of Biology Sarah Assmann and Professor of Plant Pathology Daniel Royse.

After graduating from Blue Mountain High School and starting her college career at Penn State Schuylkill, Laura transferred to the University Park campus. She believes the variety of educational experiences, with a mix of small and large classes, provided important challenges that helped her as a person and shaped her success as a student.

"It's really hard to believe when you're selected as student marshal," Laura says. "It's just not something you set out to achieve. There are so many strong students on campus and within our college that you could never start to consider the honor a possibility."

At the same time, she does know exactly when her intense interest in biology, specifically plant biology, took root.

"Professor Rod Heisey at the Schuylkill campus was an inspiration," she says. "He was always so excited about plants, and he passed that enthusiasm along to his students. He's the reason for my interest in the biology of plants more than the biology of animals."

Her parents, Linda and Wes Loder, the librarian at the Schuylkill campus, and her brother Scott and sister Lisa, students at the University Park campus, accompanied Laura to the ceremony.

Along with her academic achievements, Laura earned numerous awards and honors during her undergraduate career. She was honored as an Evan Pugh Scholar as a senior and junior, earned the Kramer Scholarship, and was named a member of Phi Beta Kappa honor society.

Familiar faces now directing Capital College schools

Two familiar faculty faces have been named to lead Penn State Capital College academic schools.

Professor of Engineering Omid Ansary is the new Director of the School of Science, Engineering, and Technology, and Professor of Education and Reading Ernest K. Dishner is the Interim Director of the School of Behavioral Sciences and Education.

Dr. Ansary, who joined the faculty in 1985, succeeds Dr. William A. Welsh, Jr., who retired from Penn State after a distinguished teaching and administrative career spanning more than 30 years. Dr. Dishner replaces Dr. William A. Henk, who accepted an academic post in Illinois.

Active in faculty governance, Dr. Ansary served five years on the Capital College Faculty Senate, including a term as its president. He has also been a member or chair of faculty committees for academic program development, selection of new faculty, administrators, and staff, for the selection of award winners, and for promotion and tenure. He was recently honored by Penn State Harrisburg with two of its annual awards — Excellence in Faculty Service and Excellence in Research.

Dr. Dishner came to Penn State Harrisburg in 1990 and served as Associate Provost and Dean of the Faculty through 1994. A former elementary and secondary teacher, he has authored or edited numerous publications and books and serves as Associate Editor of Reading Research and Instruction, the journal of the College Reading Association. His current areas of special interest are content area reading, school reform issues, the use of technology in different learning environments, and the recruitment and retention of a diverse teaching force.

Grad programs introduced

Three new graduate degree choices in behavioral sciences and psychology are now available at Penn State Harrisburg — Master of Arts programs in Applied Behavior Analysis, Applied Clinical Psychology, and Applied Psychological Research.

The Applied Clinical Psychology program prepares students to work as mental health professionals in a variety of settings and is intended to provide the academic training to apply for master's level licensing for mental health professionals in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. In addition to the broad training provided by the required courses, concentrations in General Clinical Psychology, Forensic Psychology, and Health Psychology are available.

The Applied Psychological Research program focuses on the development of research skills within the context of scientific training in psychology. The program is designed to meet the needs of students planning careers in research or administration within human service or similar organizations, or who plan to pursue doctoral study.

The Applied Behavior Analysis major is designed to prepare graduates for employment as Board Certified Behavior Analysts in hospitals, medical schools, mental health centers, health maintenance organizations, a variety of educational and forensic settings, research facilities, and in centers and home-based programs for individuals with autism and developmental disabilities.

Scholarship support increases

Talented and committed students of all ages and cultures are Penn State Capital College's lifeblood.

A major focus in the Schuylkill campus portion of the University's Grand Destiny Campaign has been to increase the number of endowed scholarships to aid deserving, qualified students.

Schuylkill campus Director of Development Jane Zintak reports the effort has been a "resounding success" with continuing community commitment. "Many people want to invest in a person rather than bricks and mortar," Zintak says of the response to the scholarship campaign. "We are beyond the \$1 million mark — about \$1.2 million — and have almost quadrupled the number of available scholarships since the beginning of the campaign. There are now 24 scholarships earmarked for students at the Schuylkill campus."

The most recent commitments to assist students at

Schuylkill have resulted in three new scholarships, including one honoring the wife of long-time campus administrator Henry I. Herring.

The Isabel P. Herring Memorial Fund has been established through the estate of Henry Herring to provide support for faculty improvement and student scholarship.

Mr. Herring, who died in 1998, served as the Administrative Head of the Schuylkill campus from 1949 until his retirement in 1978. Prior to that, he was a member of the campus Mathematics Department beginning in 1946. He earned a bachelor's degree in education in 1934 and a master's in mathematics in 1935 from Penn State. Mrs. Herring died in 1996. They were married for 51 years.

The Mishpacha Weiss Scholarship has been established through the generosity of Sam and May Weiss, Richard Weiss, Judy Weiss Levy, and Dr. Jerome Levy. Consideration for this scholarship will be given to all full-time undergraduate students attending the Schuylkill campus who are academically capable and who have a demonstrated financial need. First preference shall be given to United Metal Receptacle employees and their children regardless of which campus of Penn State they are attending. Second preference will be given to students who are pursuing degrees in engineering or information sciences and technology at Penn State Schuylkill.

The William E. Schneider Scholarship has been established through a contribution from the estate of Mr. Schneider, who died in 2000. Consideration for this scholarship will be given to all undergraduate students attending the Schuylkill campus who have achieved superior academic records or who manifest promise of outstanding academic success. Mr. Schneider was a resident of Pottsville at the time of his death.



Dr. William Connolly was recently honored for his 15-year commitment to the Penn State Schuylkill associate degree program in radiologic technology. Dr. Connolly is retiring as Medical Adviser to the program. He was recognized for his guidance and leadership in developing the program and presented with a Penn State Nittany Lion statue. Robert Lesniak, 31-year faculty member, dies

Former faculty member Robert J. Lesniak, whose teaching and administrative career at Penn State Harrisburg spanned 31 years, died Aug. 29 at Hershey Medical Center. He was 64.

Dr. Lesniak, the creator of the College's master's degree program in Training and Development, retired due to illness in December 2000 as Associate Professor Emeritus of Education.

His successful and varied career with the School of Behavioral Sciences and Education included service as Acting Associate Dean for Research and Graduate Studies (1986-87), Acting

Division Head for Behavioral Sciences and Education (1988-90), Coordinator of the master's program in Teaching and Curriculum (1972-87), Director of the doctoral program in Adult Education (1984-88), and coordinator of the master's program in Training and Development from 1985 until his retirement.

At the time of his retirement, Dr. Lesniak's academic and staff colleagues initiated a scholarship effort in honor of his untiring commitment to students. The Robert Lesniak Scholarship Fund will provide support for undergraduate and graduate students enrolled in education programs at the College.

\$675,000 grant supports training center

National respect for the quality of the College's environmental programs has resulted in a \$675,000 grant from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

The funding supports the previously established Small Public Water Systems Technology Assistance Center at the Harrisburg campus, co-directed by Berg Professor of Engineering Charles Cole and Associate Professor of Environmental Engineering Yeufeng Xie. The center is housed in the expanded Science and Technology Building.

The 1999 Safe Drinking Water Amendments focused attention on enhancing the technical, financial, and managerial capacity of public water systems to consistently comply with national drinking water regulations.

The amended act authorized EPA to make grants to institutions of higher learning to establish and operate small public water system technology assistance centers. The responsibility of these centers includes conducting training for small public water systems operators and the trainers who instruct them and also to serve as a source of technical information related to the performance and operations needs of the water systems.

Schuylkill alumni invited to share their knowledge with students as mentors

Penn State Schuylkill grads are being invited to help current students chart their career plans by serving as mentors.

The Penn State Schuylkill Alumni Society is coordinating a program which invites graduates to serve as in-class mentors for freshman students on campus. Alumni will be asked to spend an hour or two of their time speaking to first-year seminar students within their area of expertise.

The First-Year Seminar is a one- to three-credit class designed to acquaint first-year students with the academic community at the beginning of their undergraduate studies. Statistically, most students fail in college after their first semester. The challenges of balancing a new environment with studies often end in disaster. The FYS program attempts to give students the skills necessary to succeed in college. According to program coordinator, Dr. Marianne Goodfellow, "The seminar is one of the few ways we can make sure students get adequate preparation for their college experience."

Penn State faculty members teach these seminars in small sessions divided by majors or academic school. The program teaches basic study skills, use of the library and computer systems, opportunities for extra-curricular activities, and career options. It is in the career options section where alumni are needed. According to Jim Nevada, '88 Business, chairman of the Schuylkill Alumni Society's Student Interaction Committee, "Alumni have the experience and wisdom to guide these students in the right direction. Because students in these seminars are in their first semester, they may not have thought of all the options available to them for a career."

Business students gain international experience

Five Harrisburg campus undergraduate business students spent the past summer in Germany. But the journey was certainly not a vacation. The students participated in an innovative program in Applied International Business Studies formed through a partnership with the College's School of Business Administration, the German government, and the University of Erlangen-Nuremberg. The participating students, their major, and place of residence are: Kerrie Moore, Management, Harrisburg; Daniel Conklin, Finance, Greeley; Robert English, Finance, Reading; Melissa Roberts, Finance, Palmyra; and Vasna Zorkic, Finance, Harrisburg. The five classmates spent eight weeks in Germany while earning 12 credits and completing requirements for a minor in International Business.

Through the program, students are given the opportunity to: study topics covering German and European aspects of business administration and economics in courses taught in English; gain work experience in high-ranking German companies with international orientation and reputation; and learn the German language and gain insight into German and European culture.

The students spent four weeks in course study at the university and four weeks interning with a German firm.

Funding for the educational summer experience came in part through the German Academic Exchange Service's undergraduate scholarship program which "supports the increasingly recognized objective of U.S. colleges and universities to internationalize the curriculum." The program is under the auspices of the German Foreign Office and the European Recovery Program of the German Federal Government. German residents of the U.S. who support student study abroad, fund a portion of the effort.

The Penn State Harrisburg Office of International Studies also awarded each participant \$500 in privately donated funds.


First student art show slated for library gallery


