Program Notes

ACADEMIC DRESS: Academic festivals such as today's commencement exercises have their roots in medieval Europe. Medieval institutions of higher learning were customarily operated by monastic orders, and students, as well as their instructors, wore the habits of monks. In 1321, the University of Coimbra (Portugal) required all bachelors, licentiates (masters), and doctors of theology to wear monastic gowns—the first such injunction recorded. It is still the custom of students and instructors in the ancient universities of the British Isles to wear their gowns, not only to lectures, but also in their daily affairs in such cities as Oxford, Edinburgh, Aberdeen, and St. Andrews (Scotland).

Originally, the hood worn by both those holding master's degrees and those with doctoral degrees was a head covering, the monk's tippet. When caps came into fashion in the fifteenth century, the hoods were draped down and back and ornamented with rich silk or velvet linings and edgings. The cap was first conferred as a symbol of the master's degree and varies greatly in style from institution to institution. Some were stiff, some soft, some square, others round. All were decorated with a tuft at the center. The tassel used today on American "mortarboards" is an elaboration of the tuft. The mortarboard style generally followed throughout the United States was borrowed from Oxford University, where the flat-topped cap is customarily worn by those holding the master of arts degree.

The practice of wearing academic dress dates in the United States from 1754, when King George I chartered King's College (now Columbia University) and translated to the colonies academic regulations from the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge. Colonial colleges, however, rejected the scarlet robes of the English institutions in favor of black, the somber shade preferred by Puritan clergy.

During most of the nineteenth century, American colleges and universities had no standard style of academic dress. Undergraduates wore gowns only rarely during commencement exercises. Many faculty wore the garb of the European institutions where they received their degrees, and many wore robes of their own, often-eccentric design. Only a few faculty wore hoods and mortarboards. These were assumed to be articles of ecclesiastical dress, more appropriate for bishops than professors.

In 1895, a commission of leading American educators, mostly from the Ivy League colleges, was established to devise a standard code of academic dress. It decided, for instance, to adopt black as the standard color for academic robes. Undergraduates were required to wear a simple, unadorned, black robe with a mortarboard and black tassel. Candidates for the degree of master of arts were required to wear a simple robe, except that the sleeves were cut through so that the hands and lower arms could be seen. Holders of the doctorate were to wear full robes with full sleeves. Panels of velvet down the front and chevrons of the same material on the sleeves gave them a more richly ornamented appearance.

The code of 1895 is still in effect, although it was modified slightly in 1935 and again in 1960. Many universities have, under the new rules, adopted colored robes in place of the traditional black. Penn State, for example, now permits its degree holders to wear blue gowns.

The hoods of those receiving graduate degrees vary in shape and size. The larger and more heavily decorated

hood is worn by the holder of the doctoral degree. The trimming around the edge of the hood varies in color and designates the particular discipline of the degree holder. The satin linings in the hoods are customarily drawn from the official colors of the institution from which the degree was received. Penn State degrees are designated by the official blue and white satin linings.

THE MACE: An academic custom which originated in the sixteenth century is a part of today's commencement ceremonies. The academic procession is led by the Mace Bearer, carrying the official mace of Penn State Harrisburg, followed by the Commencement Marshal.

Although not as ornate as the first mace presented by Queen Elizabeth I to Oxford University in 1589, this mace probably has greater meaning to the students and faculty at the college than that felt by a similar body at Oxford more than 400 years ago.

Two faculty members and a student of the college designed and made the mace after it was realized that the University mace could not be made available for all occasions. Its design is similar to that of maces used throughout history. It was made by retired faculty members David Kravitz and William K. Aungst.

First used in the June 1973 Harrisburg commencement, it is shaped from solid walnut and was fabricated in Harrisburg's engineering laboratories. One end holds a solid cast aluminum flame which was designed by Rege Wynn Leach. Leach's design was chosen from among others submitted in competition by students enrolled in a humanities course in art technology. The other end is shaped like a crown and is decorated with highly polished Nittany Lions, replicas of the famed shrine located on the University Park campus.

Originally an instrument for battle, the mace also has a fascinating history in academic ceremonies.

Shortly after the British victory over the Spanish Armada in 1588, Queen Elizabeth visited Oxford University. At a special convocation held in her honor, the students pretended to love the queen and, thinking she was unfamiliar with Latin, lavished flattery on her and praised her profusely in Latin. As a gesture of her thanks, she stood and gave an eloquent speech in flawless Latin, at the conclusion of which she presented Oxford with her personal royal mace.

The second record of a mace being presented to a university was in 1629 when King Charles I presented his royal mace to Cambridge. It was customary thereafter in the British Isles and throughout Europe that the mace be used at all academic ceremonial occasions.

The mace came into use in the United States in the nineteenth century when academic ceremonies were becoming more elaborate and were being modeled on European customs.

It is carried in the procession with the device head up, which is symbolic of the University. Once the ceremony is completed and credentials are bestowed upon graduates, the mace is carried with the flame up, symbolizing the recognition of the knowledge they have acquired.

Norman Bristol Colón is an author and writer, strategist and international speaker, coach and chief diversity officer with a unique knowledge and perspective of Latinos, the nation's largest minority ethnic group.

In 2023, Bristol Colón was appointed by Governor Josh Shapiro as the first Commonwealth Chief Diversity Officer, leading diversity, equity, belonging,



and inclusion programs across Commonwealth agencies. The chief diversity officer partners with cabinet members, senior leaders and employees to continue to build a capable, accessible, and diverse administration that represents all Pennsylvanians. The chief diversity officer develops recruitment, performance management, leadership development, and employee engagement strategies to enhance diversity, equity, belonging, and inclusion in the Commonwealth's workforce and works with department staff to incorporate these priorities into their programs, policies, and decision making.

Bristol Colón was the first appointed chief diversity officer for the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development, where he was the principal architect of the agency's diversity, equity, belonging, and inclusion programs.

His extensive career in public service includes serving as executive director of the Governor's Advisory Commission on Latino Affairs, director of Special Projects for the PA Department of State, assistant to the PA Secretary of State, executive director of the Governor's Census 2020 Complete Count Commission, and special assistant to Deputy Secretary for Community Affairs and Economic Development.

Bristol Colón is the founder and president of the Pennsylvania Latino Convention, a comprehensive and inclusive initiative creating the statewide agenda for the more than 1.1 million Latinos in the state, covering business and entrepreneurship, education, health, housing, social justice, politics, the environment, civil rights, immigration, workforce training, and leadership/professional development.

He is recipient of numerous awards and recognitions, including Pennsylvania Person of the Year by Talk Magazine, Torch of Global Enlightenment Award by the World Affairs Council of Harrisburg, Most Influential Latino, JP McCaskey Distinguished Alumni Award, HEP/CAMP National Distinguished Alumni Award, PA Latino Gran Diamante Award, Central Penn Business Journal's 40 Under 40, and Who's Who 100 Most Influential Latinos in Pennsylvania.

Bristol Colón is a proud resident of Lancaster County and graduate of Penn State, where he served in numerous student leadership organizations. Born in Guayama, Puerto Rico, he credits his rural island upbringing for his unwavering tenacity, inclusive approach and perseverant spirit.

The Pennsylvania State University

From agricultural college to world-class learning community, Penn State's story is rooted in a mission of teaching, research, and public service. The mission seemed simple in 1855, when the Commonwealth chartered the school at the request of the Pennsylvania State Agricultural Society. The goal was to apply scientific principles to farming, a radical departure from traditional higher education, which emphasized mathematics, rhetoric, and classical languages.

Centre County was chosen as the site for the new college after Bellefonte agriculturalist and ironmaster James Irvin gave 200 acres for a campus. Founding President Evan Pugh drew on the scientific education he received in Europe to plan a curriculum combining hands-on training with theoretical studies. Penn State assumed a broader mission in 1863, when it became the Commonwealth's only land-grant institution. Congress created a system of land-grant colleges and universities to foster education not only in agriculture, but in engineering and other academic disciplines that had practical value to a nation that was rapidly industrializing. Later, land-grant institutions were also required to disseminate knowledge for the public good – the foundation of Penn State's research and public service or outreach missions.

Penn State admitted its first female undergraduates in 1871, and graduated its first international student in 1890 and first African American student in 1905. By the 1930s, it was the Commonwealth's largest conferrer of baccalaureate degrees. During that same decade the University confronted the Great Depression by establishing the first of a statewide system of campuses, offering a college education to students who were location-bound for economic reasons. Penn State now has 24 campuses, including undergraduate locations and special-mission campuses such as Penn State Health Milton S. Hershey Medical Center and Penn State Dickinson Law.

Today, Penn State awards more associate, baccalaureate, and graduate degrees than any other institution in the Commonwealth. Its outreach and research programs rank among the nation's top ten. Graduates of the University join a family of some 673,000 alumni. The Penn State Alumni Association – the largest dues-paying organization of its kind – helps Penn Staters stay connected with each other and the University through a powerful network of more than 300 chapters and other affiliated groups in all 50 states and more than 40 foreign countries.

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Penn State Harrisburg

Penn State Harrisburg is an undergraduate college and graduate school serving the south central Pennsylvania region, which includes the Commonwealth's capital city, Harrisburg.

The diversity of the student body creates a unique campus experience. A broader set of social and professional interests is apparent on campus, with various age groups, career professionals, and traditional-aged students sharing thoughts, ideas, and experiences in classes, at seminars, and socially.

Students are encouraged to explore various academic offerings and to develop a capacity for independent judgment, cross-cultural understanding, and lifelong learning that will prepare them for responsible and productive citizenship in a global society.

Penn State Harrisburg offers more than 75 associate, baccalaureate, master's, and doctoral programs, and the first two years of study leading to more than 200 Penn State undergraduate majors.

Research and scholarly activity at Penn State Harrisburg is pursued by faculty and students in all five academic schools and numerous research centers and institutes. This work spans several broad areas of strength and is deeply connected to the needs of our region. Examples include public policy research in partnership with state and local governments, business administration and engineering research with area industry, and biomedical and behavioral health research with area healthcare providers, among many others.

Since its creation, the college has grown considerably in the size and diversity of its student body and its breadth of academic offerings. To support this growth and to ensure the quality of students' educational experience, the college has undertaken numerous campus building initiatives. The newest is the Student Enrichment Center, which houses comprehensive services for students in a central location. In recent years, the college also has added state-of-the-art engineering and other laboratories, expanded athletic facilities, and student housing.

While contributing to the region through educational programs, research, and public service, the college looks to the community for support of its mission. Key among the groups to whom the college turns for counsel and support are the Board of Advisers, the advisory councils for the academic schools, and the Alumni Society Board of Directors.
